Windows: Three rectangular shaped windows with rounded tops on ground floor level. Second storey has four wooden framed round windows.

Foundation: Concrete foundation projecting with two incised bands.

Description of Decorative Architectural Features

Roof: Architrave with moulded brackets

Walls: There is ridged moulded decoration around the base of the building:


Entranceway: Ornate entranceway with half pilasters and capitals supporting mock roof, cut grante steps leading to wooden door (painted blue), glass and wooden framed transom above door.

Windows: The ground floor windows have moulded decoration around them on the exterior of the building. The decoration consists of a prominent sill and an arch with a decorative keystone in the top. 

Roof: Single pitched tile roof with corrugated modern cover.

Walls: Brick walls with thick render cover on the exterior. Interior walls are covered in plaster, but with bricks still visible. The walls are painted white. There is a balcony on the façade and rear of the upper floor, concrete floor with metal railing and wooden hand rail and metal support poles, painted blue.

Doors/ Entranceway: Façade has two large wooden, double paneled vehicle entrance doors, accessing the ground floor rooms. There is a doorway at the western side of the façade which accesses a small workroom on the ground floor and the upper floor stairwell. Rear wall has one door also at the western end with small work room and upper storey access. 

Description of Structural Elements:

Roof: The roof of the structure varies in different sections of the building. Tile and modern coverings, pitched and flat. There are several chimneys in the older section.

Walls: Main section, the walls are brick with thick render covering, painted white with blue trim on all but the façade of the uppermost floor, which has uncovered red brickwork. The rear section is thickly covered in render, also painted white. There are balconies along the central façade of each floor. The corner rooms of the façade have separate balconies on each floor.

Doors/ entrances: There are numerous doors in the building. The main entrance is on the western end of the façade. It is a large wooden door. The walkway arcade on the façade of the ground floor is reached by two sets of stone steps, one at either end of the central section. There are separate doorways to the corner rooms, these consist of full length glass and wooden French doors with full length wooden shutters. Similar doors run along the length of the central façade. The 1st and 2nd stories also have similar doorways. Many of the internal doors are modern, with some older wooden panel doors.

Windows: As mentioned in the section on doors, many of the "window" areas are actually occupied by full length glass doors in the front section. The rear section has modern metal framed windows.

Foundation: The foundation of the building could not be accessed at all points. The eastern side of the front building has cut granite foundation in places.

Location and Description of Decorative Architectural Features

Roof: The roof contains chimneys with moulding. The roofs themselves did not have any decorative features.

Façade: Three storeys; colonnaded walkways on each storey; projecting balconies on each end, whereby each floor has different decorative styles (classical). The corner balconies all have curved arches, as does the ground floor. The 1st and 2nd floors both have supporting columns with decorations carved or moulded. The railing on the ground floor has a ceramic supports with granite handrail, the 1st floor has a metal railing painted blue. The top floor also has a metal railing painted blue.

Entranceways: The doorways on the ground and first, including the full length glass doors, all have moulded decorations above them.

Side Walls: The east wall has a decorative metal framed balcony near the front. The front section has decorative styles similar to the façade. The western wall also had an outside walkway

Rear Wall: The rear wall does not contain any decorative features.

Additional Notes:

The south wall of the inner courtyard contains pigeon boxes, pigeons are traditionally associated with the FMPHQ. The pigeon boxes are painted blue. They were empty at the time of the survey.

There were no inscriptions noted during the survey.

Interior:


There are a number of traditional style fire places in the older part of the building (see photos attached to this description).

There are wooden panels with inset around the windows and doors; there is a wooden moulded staircase decoration; some original wooden floors are intact, other have been removed.

The building contained rooms for various functions, from holding cells, kitchen facilities, toilets, offices, rooms for housing electronic monitoring equipment, an employees lounge, storage rooms, map rooms and conference rooms.

Modifications:

The majority of the interior has been modified to some degree for modernization purposes as the building was a functioning office until 1996, the majority of the modifications are as mentioned above, superficial in nature. The addition of electricity and equipment was not carried out to complement the 'historical' nature of the building and a lot of damage can be seen on the walls of the interior.



Roof: Hall (ground floor section) has a flat modern roof. There is a plain parapeat running all along the edge of the roof, painted grey. There is a flag pole at the front central section of the roof. There are brickchimneys on the central section of the upper floor and on the eastern section of the upper floor.

Walls: The walls are made of red brick, not covered on the exterior. The interior of the main floor has artificial walls for displaying the artworks and the original walls cannot be seen. The upper floor has some plaster, paint on the interior walls.

Doors/ entrances: The fire hall doors consist of large glass and wooden double panel sections. The doors are hinged and can open to allow a vehicle room for exit and entrance. The main pedestrian entrance is located at the western end of the façade. It has three wooden panels. There is also a door in the eastern end of the rear wall. There are stairs leading from the rear door up to a walkway linking the fire hall to the accommodation block.

Windows: There are recatangular wooden framed windows on the upper storey. Some of the windows have fragile tile projections above them. The main style of the windows are two side by side sashes with four panels of glass each. The wooden elements are painted blue. The windows also have sills at the bottom, (brick covered in render?).

Foundation: The buildings have brick foundations. The floor in the fire hall is concrete.

Description of Decorative Architectural Features

Roof: There are no decorative features on the roof

Façaile: There is a small round vent located under the gable peak of the upper floor, painted blue







Rotten wood in window frames and shutters was noted. There are large cracks in the exterior walls, one of which was being monitored at the time of the survey. The lack of maintenance on the building has advanced the state of decay and major restoration works will be required to reinstate the structural integrity of the building.






