ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ASSESSMENT STUDY BRIEF NO. ESB-330/2020

PROJECT TITLE: Development of Tai Sheung Tok Transfer Station

(hereinafter known as the "Project")

NAME OF APPLICANT: <u>Environmental Infrastructure Division</u>,

Environmental Protection Department (hereinafter known as the "Applicant")

1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 An application (No. ESB-330/2020) for an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) study brief under section 5(1)(a) of the Environmental Impact Assessment Ordinance (EIAO) was submitted by the Applicant on 12 May 2020 with a project profile (No. PP-601/2020) (the Project Profile).
- 1.2 The Applicant proposes to develop an underground cavern site at Tai Sheung Tok for the construction and operation of a refuse transfer station (RTS) with proposed portals at Clear Water Bay Road. The Project will have a design capacity of about 1,800 tonnes per day of municipal solid waste (MSW) for providing waste transfer service covering East Kowloon and Sai Kung districts for final disposal at landfills or other disposal facilities. The location of the Project is shown in <u>Appendix A</u> and the major scope of works is described as follows:
 - (i) Formation and operation of caverns at Tai Sheung Tok and its associated tunnels, portals, ventilation system/shaft(s), open yards, new traffic junctions and/or vehicular access, etc.; and
 - (ii) Provision and operation of waste tipping and compaction plant and equipment, such as waste reception facility, waste tipping and packing facilities, mobile plant for transportation of containerized waste, odour control unit, vehicle washing facility, wastewater treatment facility, etc.
- 1.3 Subject to the review on their feasibility, ancillary facilities such as resource recovery facilities for recovering useful resources from the MSW, pre-treating source-separated food waste, and receiving small loads of renovation waste, as well as reuse of treated effluent may be incorporated into the Project. The Applicant shall also review and confirm if a berthing facility is required as part of the Project for onward marine transport of wastes from the RTS to disposal sites.

- 1.4 Based on the information provided in the Project Profile, the Project will comprise the following designated projects. Any other works fall under Schedule 2 of the EIAO will be identified during the course of the EIA.
 - (i) Item G.2, Part I, Schedule 2 of the EIAO "A refuse transfer station";
 - (ii) Item Q.1, Part I, Schedule 2 of the EIAO "All projects including new access roads, railways, sewers, sewage treatment facilities, earthworks, dredging works and other building works partly or wholly in a Conservation Area"; and
 - (iii) Item Q.2, Part I, Schedule 2 of the EIAO "Underground rock caverns".
- 1.5 Pursuant to section 5(7)(a) of the EIAO, the Director of Environmental Protection (the Director) issues this EIA study brief to the Applicant to carry out an EIA study.
- 1.6 The purpose of this EIA study is to provide information on the nature and extent of environmental impacts arising from the construction and operation of the Project and associated works that will take place concurrently. This information will contribute to decisions by the Director on:
 - (i) the overall acceptability of any adverse environmental consequences that are likely to arise as a result of the Project;
 - (ii) the conditions and requirements for the detailed design, construction and operation of the Project to mitigate against adverse environmental consequences wherever practicable; and
 - (iii) the acceptability of residual impacts after the proposed mitigation measures are implemented.

2. OBJECTIVES OF THE EIA STUDY

- 2.1 The objectives of the EIA study are as follows:
 - (i) to describe the Project and associated works together with the requirements and environmental benefits for carrying out the proposed project;
 - (ii) to identify and describe the elements of the community and environment likely to be affected by the Project and/or likely to cause adverse impacts to the Project, including both the natural and man-made environment and the associated environmental constraints;
 - (iii) to identify and quantify emission sources and determine the significance of impacts on sensitive receivers and potential affected uses;
 - (iv) to identify and quantify any potential losses or damage to flora, fauna and natural habitats;

- (v) to identify any landscape and visual impacts and to propose measures to mitigate these impacts;
- (vi) to identify and quantify waste management requirements arising from the construction and operation of the Project and to propose measures to mitigate these impacts;
- (vii) to propose the provision of infrastructure or mitigation measures so as to minimize pollution, environmental disturbance and nuisance during construction and operation of the Project;
- (viii) to investigate the feasibility, effectiveness and implications of the proposed mitigation measures;
- (ix) to identify, predict and evaluate the residual (i.e. after practicable mitigation) environmental impacts and the cumulative effects expected to arise during the construction and operation phases of the project in relation to the sensitive receivers and potential affected uses;
- (x) to identify, assesses and specify methods, measures and standards, to be included in the detailed design, construction and operation of the Project which are necessary to mitigate these residual environmental impacts and cumulative effects and reduce them to acceptable levels;
- (xi) to design and specify the environmental monitoring and audit requirements; and
- (xii) to identify any additional studies necessary to implement the mitigation measures of monitoring and proposals recommended in the EIA report.

3. DETAILED REQUIREMENTS OF THE EIA STUDY

3.1 The Purpose

The purpose of this study brief is to set out the purposes and objectives of the EIA study, the scope of environmental issues which shall be addressed, the requirements that the EIA study shall need to fulfil, and the necessary procedural and reporting requirements. The Applicant shall demonstrate in the EIA report whether the criteria in the relevant sections of the Technical Memorandum on the Environmental Impact Assessment Process of the Environmental Impact Assessment Ordinance (hereinafter referred to as "the TM") are fully complied with.

3.2 The Scope

- 3.2.1 The scope of this EIA study shall cover the Project and associated works mentioned in sections 1.2 1.3 of this EIA study brief. For the purpose of assessing whether the environmental impacts shall comply with the criteria of the TM, the EIA study shall address the key issues described below, together with any other key issues identified during the course of the EIA study:
 - (i) environmental benefits and dis-benefits of different development options, design and construction methods of the Project with a view to deriving the preferred development option(s) that will avoid or minimise adverse environmental impact;
 - (ii) potential air quality and odour impacts on air sensitive receivers (ASRs) due to the construction and operation of the Project;
 - (iii) potential noise impacts on noise sensitive receivers (NSRs) due to the construction and operation of the Project;
 - (iv) potential terrestrial ecological impacts arising from the construction and operation of the Project;
 - (v) potential landscape and visual impacts due to the construction and operation of the Project;
 - (vi) potential water quality impacts on water sensitive receivers (WSRs) and any water systems in the vicinity, such as groundwater system due to construction and operation of the Project;
 - (vii) potential waste management implications arising from the construction and operation of the Project, including construction and demolition materials generated from excavation of tunnels and caverns;
 - (viii) potential hazard to life impact during construction and operation of the Project due to the two petrol-cum-LPG filling stations currently operated by ExxonMobil and Sinopec respectively in the vicinity of the Project; potential hazard to life impact due to explosives if use of explosives for rock blasting is required and there exists magazine(s) for overnight storage of explosives for the Project; and
 - (ix) potential cumulative environmental impacts of the Project, through interaction or in combination with other existing committed and planned projects in the vicinity of the Project.

3.3 Description of the Project

3.3.1 Purpose(s) and Objectives of the Project

3.3.1.1 The Applicant shall provide information on the purpose(s) and objectives of the Project, and describe the environmental benefits of the Project and scenarios with and without the Project.

3.3.2 <u>Details of the Project</u>

3.3.2.1 The Applicant shall indicate the nature and status of Project decision(s) for which the EIA study is undertaken. The Applicant shall describe Project details that may affect the potential environmental impacts, including the proposed siting, scale/size, layout design, construction methods, sequence of construction works, vehicular access arrangements, location of ventilation system/shaft(s), emergency situations (such as equipment breakdown, major traffic accident, fire, sudden increase in demand before/after public holidays and typhoon), and other major activities involved in the construction and operation phases of the Project, using diagrams, plans and/or maps as necessary. The estimated duration of the construction phase and operational phase of the Project together with the programme within these phases, where appropriate, shall be given. The land taken by the Project site(s), construction sites and any associated access arrangements, auxiliary facilities and landscaping areas shall be shown on a scaled map. The uses of the Project shall be described and the different land use areas shall be demarcated as appropriate.

3.3.3 Background and History of the Project

3.3.3.1 The Applicant shall provide information on the site location and site history of the Project, interactions with other projects, and the consideration of the different development options, taking into account the principles of avoidance, minimizing and control of adverse environmental impacts. The options might include siting, transportation route(s), emergency access, location of vehicular entrances/exits, operation modes (such as overnight waste storage, operating hours of RTS, etc.), scale/size, layout design, construction methods and sequence of construction works for the Project. The key reasons for selecting the proposed development options and siting, and the part environmental factors played in the selection shall be described. The main environmental impacts of different development options shall be compared with those of the Project and with the likely future environmental conditions in the absence of the Project.

3.4 Technical Requirements

3.4.1 The Applicant shall conduct the EIA study to address all environmental aspects of the activities described in the scope as set out above. The assessment shall be based on the best and latest information available during the course of the EIA study.

3.4.2 The EIA study shall follow the technical requirements specified below and in the Appendices of this EIA study brief.

3.4.3 Air Quality Impact

- 3.4.3.1 The Applicant shall follow the criteria and guidelines for evaluating and assessing air quality impact as stated in section 1 of Annex 4 and Annex 12 of the TM respectively.
- 3.4.3.2 The assessment area for air quality (including odour) impact assessment shall be defined by a distance of 500 meters from the boundary of the Project site and any associated works as identified in the EIA, which shall be extended to include major existing, planned and committed air pollutant emission sources that may have a bearing on the environmental acceptability of the Project. The assessment shall include the existing, planned and committed sensitive receivers within the study area as well as areas where air quality may be potentially affected by the Project. The assessment shall be based on the best available information at the time of the assessment. The assessment shall take into account the impacts of nearby concurrent projects, and also the major point sources which are located within 4 km from the assessment area, if any, which should be modelled by dispersion model to account for the spatial variations in background concentrations induced by them.
- 3.4.3.3 The assessment of air quality impact arising from the construction and operation of the Project shall follow the detailed technical requirements given in <u>Appendix B</u> of this EIA study brief.

3.4.4 Noise Impact

- 3.4.4.1 The Applicant shall follow the criteria and guidelines for evaluating and assessing noise impact as stated in Annexes 5 and 13 of the TM.
- 3.4.4.2 The assessment area for the noise impact assessment shall generally include areas within 300m from the boundary of the Project site and any associated works as identified in the EIA study. Subject to the agreement of the Director, the assessment area could be reduced accordingly if the first layer of noise sensitive receivers (NSRs), closer than 300m from the outer Project limit, provides acoustic shielding to those receivers at distances further away from the Project. The assessment area shall be expanded to include NSRs at distances over 300m from the Project which are affected by the construction and operation of the Project. The assessment shall cover the potential noise impacts due to the construction and operation of the Project, including the noise generated from construction equipment during construction and fixed plant noise arising from ventilation system and some ancillary facilities of the Project as well as road traffic noise impact during operation on the existing, committed and planned noise sensitive receivers (NSRs) earmarked on the relevant Outline Zoning Plans, Development Permission Area Plans, Outline Development Plans, Layout Plans and other relevant published land

use plans, including plans and drawings published by the Lands Department and any land use and development applications approved by the Town Planning Board, in the vicinity of the project.

3.4.4.3 The noise impact assessment shall follow the detailed technical requirements given in <u>Appendix C</u> of this EIA study brief.

3.4.5 Ecological Impact (Terrestrial)

- 3.4.5.1 The Applicant shall follow the criteria and guidelines for evaluating and assessing ecological impact as stated in Annexes 8 and 16 of the TM respectively.
- 3.4.5.2 The assessment area for the purpose of the terrestrial ecological impact assessment shall include areas within 500 metres distance from the boundary of the Project and any associated works as well as any other area likely to be impacted by the Project.
- 3.4.5.3 The ecological impact assessment for the construction and operation of the Project shall follow the detailed technical requirements given in <u>Appendix D</u> of this EIA study brief.

3.4.6 Landscape and Visual Impact

- 3.4.6.1 The Applicant shall follow the criteria and guidelines for evaluating and assessing landscape and visual impacts, including glare impact, as stated in Annexes 10 and 18 of the TM respectively, and the EIAO Guidance Note No. 8/2010 "Preparation of Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment under the EIAO" and the report of "Landscape Value Mapping in HK".
- 3.4.6.2 The assessment area for the landscape impact assessment shall include landscape character areas and landscape resources within 500 metres from the boundary of the Project and the works of the Project as identified in the EIA, while the assessment area for the visual impact assessment shall be defined by the visual envelope of the Project. The extent of the defined visual envelope shall be shown on a plan and documented in the EIA report.
- 3.4.6.3 The landscape and visual impact assessment for the construction and operation of the Project shall follow the detailed technical requirements given in <u>Appendix E</u> of this EIA study brief.

3.4.7 Water Quality Impact

- 3.4.7.1 The Applicant shall follow the criteria and guidelines for evaluating and assessing water pollution as stated in Annexes 6 and 14 of the TM respectively.
- 3.4.7.2 The assessment area for the water quality impact assessment shall include areas within 500 metres from the boundary of the Project and shall cover the Victoria

Harbour (Phase 1) Water Control Zone and other affected Water Control Zones as designated under the Water Pollution Control Ordinance (Cap. 358), and water sensitive receivers and water systems including natural streams, drainage and groundwater system, and nearby service reservoirs in the vicinity of the Project. The assessment area shall be extended to include other areas if they are found also being affected by the Project during the EIA study and have a bearing on the environmental acceptability of the Project.

3.4.7.3 The water quality impact assessment for the construction and operation of the Project shall follow the detailed technical requirements given in Appendix F of this EIA study brief.

3.4.8 Hazard to Life

- 3.4.8.1 The Applicant shall follow the criteria for evaluating hazard to life as stated in Section 2 of Annex 4 of the TM.
- 3.4.8.2 The assessment shall include the hazards due to the two petrol-cum-LPG filling stations currently operated by ExxonMobil and Sinopec respectively in the vicinity of the Project, as well as any nearby potentially hazardous sources.
- 3.4.8.3 If use of explosives for rock blasting is required and there exists magazine(s) for overnight storage of explosives for the Project, potential hazard to life impact due to explosives shall be addressed.
- 3.4.8.4 The hazard to life assessment shall follow the detailed technical requirements given in <u>Appendix G</u> of this EIA study brief.

3.4.9 Waste Management Implication

- 3.4.9.1 The Applicant shall follow the criteria and guidelines for evaluating and assessing waste management implication as stated in Annexes 7 and 15 of the TM.
- 3.4.9.2 The assessment of the waste management implications arising from the construction and operation of the Project shall follow the detailed technical requirements given in Appendix H of this EIA study brief.

3.4.10 Land Contamination

- 3.4.10.1 The Applicant shall follow the guidelines for evaluating and assessing potential land contamination issues as stated in Sections 3.1 and 3.2 of Annex 19 of the TM.
- 3.4.10.2 The assessment of the potential land contamination issues shall follow the detailed technical requirements given in Appendix I of this EIA study brief.

3.5 Environmental Monitoring and Audit (EM&A) Requirements

- 3.5.1 The Applicant shall identify and justify in the EIA study whether there is any need for EM&A activities during construction and operation of the Project and, if affirmative, to define the scope of EM&A requirements for the Project in EIA study.
- 3.5.2 Subject to the confirmation of the EIA study findings, the Applicant shall comply with the requirements as stipulated in Annex 21 of the TM.
- 3.5.3 The Applicant shall prepare a Project Implementation Schedule (in the form of a checklist as shown in <u>Appendix J</u>) containing all the EIA study recommendations and mitigation measures with reference to the implementation programme.

3.6 Presentation of Summary Information

3.6.1 Summary of Environmental Outcomes

The EIA report shall contain a summary of key environmental outcomes arising from the EIA study, including estimated population protected from various environmental impacts, environmentally sensitive areas protected, environmentally friendly options considered and incorporated in the preferred option, environmental designs recommended, key environmental problems avoided, compensation areas included and the environmental benefits of environmental protection measures recommended.

3.6.2 Summary of Environmental Impacts

To facilitate effective retrieval of pertinent key information, the EIA report shall contain a summary table of environmental impacts showing the assessment points, results of impact predictions, relevant standards or criteria, extents of exceedances predicted, impact avoidance measures considered, mitigation measures proposed and residual impacts (after mitigation). This summary shall cover each individual impact and shall also form an essential part of the executive summary of the EIA report.

3.6.3 <u>Documentation of Key Assessment Assumptions, Limitation of Assessment Methodologies and related Prior Agreement(s) with the Director</u>

The EIA report shall contain a summary including the assessment methodologies and key assessment assumptions adopted in the EIA study, the limitations of these assessment(s) methodologies/assumptions, if any, plus relevant prior agreement(s) with the Director or other Authorities on individual environmental media assessment components. The proposed use of any alternative assessment tool(s) or assumption(s) have to be justified by the Applicant, with supporting documents based on cogent, scientific and objectively derived reason(s) before seeking the Director's agreement. The supporting documents shall be provided in the EIA report.

3.6.4 <u>Summary of Alternative Mitigation Measures</u>

The EIA report shall contain a summary of alternative development options and measures considered during the course of EIA study, including location, size/scale, design, layout and mode of operation as well as construction methods, disposal/treatment methods and sequences of works for the Project, with a view to avoiding or minimising and mitigating adverse environmental impacts. A comparison of the environmental benefits and dis-benefits of applying different mitigation measures shall be made. This summary shall cover the key impacts and shall also form an essential part of the executive summary of the EIA report.

3.6.5 Documentation of Public Concerns

The EIA report shall contain a summary of the main concerns of the general public, special interest groups and the relevant statutory or advisory bodies received and identified by the Applicant during the course of the EIA study, and describe how the relevant concerns have been taken into account. To facilitate the public to understand the Project, the Applicant should consider making use of 3-dimensional electronic visualisation tools during public consultation and/or stakeholder engagement exercise(s).

4. **DURATION OF VALIDITY**

4.1 The Applicant shall notify the Director of the commencement of the EIA study. If the EIA study does not commence within 36 months after the date of issue of this EIA study brief, the Applicant shall apply to the Director for a fresh EIA study brief before commencement of the EIA study.

5. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

- In preparing the EIA report, the Applicant shall refer to Annex 11 of the TM for the contents of an EIA report. The Applicant shall also refer to Annex 20 of the TM, which stipulates the guidelines for the review of an EIA report. When submitting the EIA report to the Director, the Applicant shall provide a summary, pointing out where in the EIA report the respective requirements of this EIA study brief and the TM (in particular Annexes 11 and 20) have been addressed and fulfilled.
- 5.2 The Applicant shall supply the Director with hard and electronic copies of the EIA report and the executive summary in accordance with the requirements given in Appendix K. The Applicant shall, upon request, make additional copies the above documents available to the public, subject to payment by the interested parties of full costs of printing.
- 5.3 To facilitate enhanced public engagement in the EIA process, the Applicant shall produce 3-dimensional electronic visualisations of the key findings of the EIA report, including baseline environmental information, the environmental situations

with or without the Project, associated works, supporting facilities and essential infrastructures, key mitigated and unmitigated environmental impacts, and key recommended environmental mitigation measures so that the public can better understand the Project and the associated key environmental issues. The visualisations shall be based on the EIA report findings and shall be developed and constructed such that they can be accessed and viewed by the public through an internet browser and/or other tools of 3-dimensional electronic visualisations (i.e. Virtual Reality, Augmented Reality, Mixed Reality) at a reasonable speed and without the need for software license requirement at the user's end. The visualisations shall be submitted in 10 copies of CD-ROM, DVD±R or other suitable means as agreed with the Director.

6. OTHER PROCEDURAL REQUIREMENTS

- 6.1 If there is any change in the name of Applicant for this EIA study brief during the course of the EIA study, the Applicant must notify the Director immediately.
- 6.2 If there is any key change in the scope of the Project mentioned in sections 1.2 1.3 of this EIA study brief and in the Project Profile (No. PP-601/2020), the Applicant must seek confirmation from the Director in writing on whether or not the scope of issues covered by this EIA study brief can still cover the key changes, and the additional issues, if any, that the EIA study must also address. If the changes to the Project fundamentally alter the key scope of the EIA study brief, the Applicant shall apply to the Director for a fresh EIA study brief.



Appendix B

Requirements for Air Quality Impact Assessment

The air quality impact assessment shall include the following:

1. Background and Analysis of Activities

- (i) Provision of background information relating to air quality issues relevant to the Project, e.g. description of the types of activities of the Project that may affect air quality during construction and operation stages of the Project.
- (ii) Provision of an account, where appropriate, of the consideration/ measures that have been taken into consideration during the planning of the Project to avoid and minimise the air pollution impact. The Applicant shall consider alternative construction methods, means of transportation for construction materials, phasing programmes and alternative modes of operation to minimise the air quality impact during construction and operation stages of the Project.
- (iii) Presentation of background air quality levels in the assessment for the purpose of evaluating cumulative air quality impacts during construction and operation stages of the Project. If the PATH (Pollutants in the Atmosphere and their Transport over Hong Kong) model is used to estimate the future background air quality, details for the estimation of all emission sources to be adopted in the model runs should be clearly presented.

2. <u>Identification of Air Sensitive Receivers (ASRs) and Examination of Emission/</u> <u>Dispersion Characteristics</u>

- (i) Identification and description of existing, committed and planned ASRs that would likely be affected by the Project, including those earmarked on the relevant Outline Zoning Plans, Development Permission Area Plans, Outline Development Plans and Layout Plans and other relevant published land use plans, including plans and drawings published by Lands Department and any land use and development applications approved by the Town Planning Board. The Applicant shall select the assessment points of the identified ASRs that represent the worst impact point of these ASRs. A map clearly showing the location and description such as name of buildings, their uses and height of the selected assessment points shall be given. The separation distances of these ASRs from the nearest emission sources shall also be given.
- (ii) Provision of a list of air pollution emission sources, including any nearby emission sources which are likely to have impact related to the Project based on the analysis of the construction and operation activities in section 1 above. Examples of construction stage emission sources and nearby dust emission

sources include site clearance, excavation, backfilling, blasting, vehicular movements, etc. Examples of operational stage emission sources include odour and gaseous emissions from the refuse transfer station and associated facilities, odour from transport of any waste and sludge, emissions from road vehicles, chimneys, etc. Confirmation regarding the validity of the assumptions adopted and the magnitude of the activities (e.g. volume of construction material to be handled, etc.) shall be obtained from the relevant government departments/authorities, where applicable, and documented in the EIA report.

- (iii) Identification of chimneys and obtainment of relevant chimney emission data in the assessment area, where appropriate, by carrying out a survey for assessing the cumulative air quality impact of air pollutants through chimneys. The Applicant shall ensure and confirm the validity of the emission data used in their assessment. Any errors found in their emission data used may render the submission invalid.
- (iv) The emissions from any concurrent projects identified as relevant during the course of the EIA study shall be taken into account as contributing towards the overall cumulative air quality impact. The impact as affecting the existing, committed and planned ASRs within the study area shall be assessed, based on the best information available at the time of assessment.

3. Construction Phase Air Quality Impact

- (i) The Applicant shall follow the requirements stipulated under the Air Pollution Control (Construction Dust) Regulation to ensure that construction dust impacts are controlled within the relevant standards as stipulated in section 1 of Annex 4 of the TM.
- (ii) If the Applicant anticipates that the Project will give rise to significant construction dust impacts likely to exceed recommended limits in the TM at the ASRs despite the incorporation of the dust control measures proposed, a quantitative assessment shall be carried out to evaluate the construction dust impact at the identified ASRs. The Applicant shall follow the methodology set out in section 5 below when carrying out the quantitative assessment.
- (iii) Where necessary, the Applicant shall consider and evaluate direct mitigation measures, including water-spraying, re-scheduling construction programme to minimise concurrent dust impact arising from different construction sites, for fugitive dust control. The Applicant shall describe the means of transportation and their routings involved, with a view to addressing potential dust nuisance caused by transportation activities. Any mitigation measures recommended for fugitive dust control should be well documented in the EIA report.

(iv) A monitoring and audit programme for the construction phase of the Project shall be devised to verify the effectiveness of the proposed control measures so as to ensure proper control of fugitive dust emission.

4. Operational Phase Air Quality Impact

- (i) The Applicant shall assess the expected air quality impact arising from the activities in the proposed Project site, including odour and gaseous emissions, if any, from the refuse transfer station and associated facilities, and odour from transport of general refuse, sludge and organic waste/ pre-treated food waste, during the operational phase based on assumed reasonably worst case scenario under normal operating condition.
- (ii) If the Applicant anticipates that the Project will give rise to significant operational phase air quality impacts likely to exceed the recommended limits in the TM at the ASRs, a quantitative assessment should be carried out to evaluate the operational phase air quality impacts at the identified ASRs. The Applicant shall follow the methodology set out in section 5 below when carrying out the quantitative assessment.
- (iii) A monitoring and audit programme for the operational stage shall be devised to verify the effectiveness of the control measures proposed so as to ensure proper operational odour control.

5. Quantitative Assessment Methodology

- (i) The Applicant shall conduct the quantitative assessment by applying the general principles enunciated in the modelling guidelines in <u>Appendix B-1</u> while making allowance for the specific characteristic of the Project. This specific methodology must be documented in such level of details, preferably assisted with tables and diagrams, to allow the readers of the EIA report to grasp how the model has been set up to simulate the situation under study without referring to the model input files.
- (ii) Detailed calculations of air pollutants emission rates for input to the model shall be presented in the EIA report. The Applicant must ensure consistency between the text description and the model files at every stage of submissions for review. In case of doubt, prior agreement between the Applicant and the Director on the specific modelling details should be sought.
- (iii) The Applicant shall identify the key/representative air pollution parameters (types of pollutants and averaging time concentrations) to be evaluated and provide explanation for selecting such parameters for assessing the impact from the Project.

- The air pollution impacts of future road traffic shall be calculated based on the (iv) highest emission strength from the road vehicles in the assessment area within the next 15 years upon commissioning of the Project. The Applicant shall demonstrate that the selected year of assessment represents the highest emission scenario given the combination of vehicular emission factors and traffic flow for the selected year. The Applicant may use EMFAC-HK model released by the Director to determine the Fleet Average Emission Factors, taking into account vehicle fleet mix and other necessary data on each road section. Unless otherwise agreed by the Director, the latest version of the EMFAC-HK model shall be used. Use of any alternatives to the EMFAC-HK model shall be agreed with the Director. The traffic forecast data and assumptions, such as the hourly traffic volume, average speed, vehicle composition and number of trips data and the exhaust technology fractions, vehicle age/population distribution, etc. that are used in the assessment shall be presented.
- (v) If vehicle tunnels and/or full enclosures are proposed in the Project, it is the responsibility of the Applicant to ensure that the air quality inside these proposed structures shall comply with EPD's "Practice Note on Control of Air Pollution in Vehicle Tunnels". When assessing air quality impact due to emissions from tunnels/full enclosures, the Applicant shall ensure prior agreement with the relevant ventilation design engineer over the amount and the types/kinds of pollutants emitted from these full enclosures; and such assumptions shall be clearly and properly documented in the EIA report.
- (vi) If there are any direct technical noise remedies recommended in the study, the air quality implication, i.e. comparison between with and without noise remedies scenario, due to these technical remedies shall be assessed. For instance, if barriers that may affect dispersion of air pollutants are proposed, then the implications of such remedies on air quality impact shall be assessed. If noise enclosure is proposed, then portal emissions of the enclosed road section shall also be assessed. The Applicant shall highlight clearly the locations and types of agreed noise mitigating measures (where applicable), be they noise barriers, road enclosures and their portals, and affected ASRs, on contour maps for reference.
- (vii) Ozone Limiting Method (OLM) or Discrete Parcel Method (DPM) or other appropriate method shall be used to estimate the conversion ratio of NOx to NO2 if NO2 has been identified as a key/representative air pollutant.
- (viii) The Applicant shall calculate the overall cumulative air quality impact at the ASRs identified under section 2 above and compare these results against the criteria set out in section 1 of Annex 4 in the TM. The predicted air quality impacts (both unmitigated and mitigated) shall be presented in the form of summary table(s) and pollution contours, to be evaluated against the relevant air quality standards and on any effect they may have on the land use

implications. Plans of a suitable scale should be used to present pollution contours to allow buffer distance requirements to be determined properly.

(ix) For the quantitative assessment of the odour emission impact upon the identified ASRs, the odour emission strength/ rates shall be based on the results of odorous air sampling/ measurement conducted directly at the odour emission sources of the facilities with similar characteristic. The designed performance of the deodourisation system (e.g. guaranteed odour removal efficiency, guaranteed outlet concentration, etc.) shall be provided. The details of such odorous air sampling/ measurement, including the methodology and calculation of the odour emission strength/rates, and the designed performance of deodourisation system, shall be presented in the EIA report.

6. <u>Mitigation Measures for Air Quality Impact</u>

Consideration for Mitigation Measures

(i) When the predicted air quality impact exceeds the criteria set in section 1 of Annex 4 in the TM, the Applicant shall consider mitigation measures to reduce the air quality impact on the identified ASRs. The feasibility, practicability, programming and effectiveness of the recommended mitigation measures shall be assessed and documented in the EIA report. Specific reasons for not adopting certain workable mitigation measures to reduce the air quality to a level meeting the criteria in the TM or to maximise the protection of the ASRs as far as possible should be clearly substantiated and documented in the EIA report.

Evaluation of Residual Air Quality Impact

(ii) Upon consideration of mitigation measures, if the mitigated air quality impact still exceeds the relevant criteria in Annex 4 of the TM, the Applicant shall identify, predict, and evaluate the residual air quality impact in accordance with section 4.4.3 and section 4.5.1(d) of the TM.

7. Submission of Emission Calculation Details and Model Files

All input and output file(s) of the model run(s), including those files for the generation of pollution contours as well as the emissions calculation worksheets, shall be submitted to the Director in electronic format together with the submission of the EIA report.

Appendix B-1

<u>Air Quality Modelling Guidelines</u>

[The information contained in this Appendix is meant to assist the Applicant in performing the air quality assessment. The Applicant must exercise professional judgment in applying this general information.]

The air quality modelling guidelines shall include the following guidelines as published on the website of the Environmental Protection Department

- i) Guidelines on Choice of Models and Model Parameters (Revised);
- ii) Guidelines on Assessing the 'Total' Air Quality Impacts (Revised);
- iii) Guidelines on the Use of Alternative Computer Models in Air Quality Assessment;
- iv) Guidelines on the Estimation of PM2.5 for Air Quality Assessment in Hong Kong; and
- v) Guidelines on the Estimation of 10-minute Average SO2 Concentration for Air Quality Assessment in Hong Kong.

Appendix C

Requirements for Noise Impact Assessment

The noise impact assessment shall include the following:

1. <u>Description of the Noise Environment</u>

- 1.1 The Applicant shall describe the prevailing noise environment in the EIA report.
- 1.2 The Applicant shall conduct prevailing background noise surveys to determine the standards for evaluating noise impact from fixed noise source. The respective noise environment should be documented in the EIA report.

2. <u>Construction Noise Impact Assessment</u>

- 2.1 Construction Noise Impact Assessment Methodology
- 2.1.1 The Applicant shall carry out construction noise impact assessment (excluding percussive piling) of the Project during daytime, i.e. 7am to 7pm, on weekdays other than general holidays in accordance with methodology in paragraphs 5.3 and 5.4 of Annex 13 of the TM.

2.2 Identification of Construction Noise Impact

- 2.2.1 Identification of Assessment Area and Noise Sensitive Receivers (NSRs)
 - (a) The Applicant shall propose the assessment area for agreement of the Director before commencing the assessment. The assessment area for the construction noise impact assessment shall generally include areas within 300 metres from the boundary of the Project and the works of the Project.
 - (b) The Applicant shall identify all existing, committed and planned NSRs in the assessment area and select assessment points to represent identified NSRs for carrying out quantitative construction noise impact assessment described below.
 - (c) The assessment points shall be confirmed with the Director prior to the commencement of the quantitative construction noise impact assessment and may be varied subject to the best and latest information available during the course of the EIA study.
 - (d) A map showing the location and description such as name of building, use, and floor of each and every selected assessment point shall be given. Photographs of existing NSRs shall be appended to the EIA report.

2.2.2 Inventory of Noise Sources

The Applicant shall identify and quantify an inventory of noise sources for representative construction equipment for the purpose of construction noise impact assessment.

2.3 <u>Prediction and Evaluation of Construction Noise Impact</u>

2.3.1 Phases of Construction

The Applicant shall identify representative phases of construction that would have noticeable varying construction noise emissions at existing, committed and planned NSRs at the assessment area for agreement of the Director before commencing the construction noise impact assessment.

2.3.2 Scenarios

The Applicant shall quantitatively assess the construction noise impact, with respect to criteria set in Annex 5 of the TM, of unmitigated scenario and mitigated scenario at different phases of construction of the Project.

2.3.3 Prediction of Noise Impact

- (a) The Applicant shall present the predicted noise levels in Leq (30 min) dB(A) at the selected assessment points at various representative floor levels (in m P.D.) on tables and plans of suitable scale.
- (b) The assessment shall cover the cumulative construction noise impact resulting from the construction works of the Project and other concurrent projects identified during the course of the EIA study on existing NSRs within the assessment area.
- (c) The potential construction noise impact under different phases of construction shall be quantified by estimating the total number of dwellings, classrooms and other noise sensitive receivers that will be exposed to noise impact exceeding the criteria set in Annex 5 in the TM.
- (d) The Applicant shall, as far as practicable, formulate a reasonable construction programme so that no work will be required in restricted hours as defined under the Noise Control Ordinance (NCO). In case the Applicant needs to evaluate whether construction works in restricted hours as defined under the NCO are feasible or not in the context of programming construction works, reference should be made to relevant technical memoranda issued under the NCO. Regardless of the results of construction noise impact assessment for restricted hours, the Noise Control Authority will process Construction Noise Permit (CNP) application, if necessary, based on the NCO, the relevant technical

memoranda issued under the NCO, and the contemporary conditions/situations. This aspect should be explicitly stated in the noise chapter and the conclusions and recommendations chapter in EIA report.

2.4 <u>Mitigation of Construction Noise Impact</u>

2.4.1 Direct Mitigation Measures

Where the predicted construction noise impact exceeds the criteria set in Table 1B of Annex 5 of the TM, the Applicant shall consider and evaluate direct mitigation measures including movable barriers, enclosures, quieter alternative methods, re-scheduling, restricting hours of operation of noisy tasks, etc. The feasibility, practicability, programming and effectiveness of the recommended mitigation measures shall be assessed. Any direct mitigation measures recommended should be well documented in the report. Specific reasons for not adopting certain direct mitigation measures to reduce the noise to a level meeting the criteria in the TM or to maximise the protection for the NSRs as far as possible should be clearly substantiated and documented in the EIA report.

2.5 Evaluation of Residual Construction Noise Impact

Upon exhaust of direct mitigation measures, if the mitigated noise impact still exceeds the relevant criteria in Annex 5 of the TM, the Applicant shall identify, predict, evaluate the residual construction noise impact in accordance with section 4.4.3 of the TM and estimate the total number of existing dwellings, classrooms and other noise sensitive elements that will be exposed to residual noise impact exceeding the criteria set in Annex 5 in the TM.

3. Road Traffic Noise Impact Assessment

3.1 Road Traffic Noise Impact Assessment Methodology

3.1.1 The Applicant shall carry out road traffic noise impact assessment in respect of each road section (within the meaning of Items A.1 and A.7 under Part I, Schedule 2 of the EIAO and other road sections) and the noise levels from combined road sections of the Project at the NSRs in accordance with methodology in paragraphs 5.1 of Annex 13 of the TM.

3.1.2 Input Data of Computational Model

The Applicant shall provide the input data set of the road traffic noise computational model adopted in the assessment for various scenarios. The data shall be in electronic text file (ASCII format) containing road segments, barriers and noise sensitive receivers information. CD-ROM(s) containing the above data shall be submitted together with the EIA report.

3.2 Identification of Road Traffic Noise Impact

3.2.1 *Identification of Assessment Area and Noise Sensitive Receivers*

- (a) The Applicant shall propose the assessment area for agreement of the Director before commencing the assessment. The assessment area for the road traffic noise impact shall generally include areas within 300 metres from the boundary of the Project and the works of the Project.
- (b) The Applicant shall identify all existing, committed and planned NSRs in the assessment area and select assessment points to represent identified NSRs for carrying out quantitative road traffic noise impact assessment described below.
- (c) The assessment points shall be confirmed with the Director prior to the commencement of the quantitative road traffic noise impact assessment and may be varied subject to the best and latest information available during the course of the EIA study.
- (d) A map showing the location and description such as name of building, use, and floor of each and every selected assessment point shall be given. Photographs of existing NSRs shall be appended to the EIA report.
- (e) For planned noise sensitive land uses without committed site layouts, the Applicant should use the relevant landuse and planning parameters and conditions to work out representative site layouts for road traffic noise impact assessment purpose. However, such parameters and conditions together with any constraints identified shall be confirmed with the relevant responsible parties including Planning Department and Lands Department.

3.2.2 Inventory of Noise Sources

- (a) The Applicant shall analyse the scope of the proposed road alignment(s) to identify road sections for the purpose of road traffic noise impact assessment. Road sections to be included in road traffic noise impact assessment shall be confirmed with the Director prior to the commencement of the assessment.
- (b) Validity of the traffic flow prediction of road sections for the purpose of road traffic noise impact assessment shall be confirmed with Transport Department and documented in the EIA report.

3.3 <u>Prediction and Evaluation of Road Traffic Noise Impact</u>

3.3.1 Scenarios

- (a) The Applicant shall quantitatively assess the road traffic noise impact of the Project, with respect to the criteria set in Annex 5 of the TM, of unmitigated scenario and mitigated scenario at assessment year. The assessment year shall be made reference to section 5.1 in Annex 13 of the TM.
- (b) The Applicant shall provide the input data sets of traffic noise model prediction model adopted in the EIA study as requested by the Director for the following scenarios:
 - (i) unmitigated scenario at assessment year;
 - (ii) mitigated scenario at assessment year; and
 - (iii) prevailing scenario for indirect mitigated measures eligibility assessment.

3.3.2 Prediction of Noise Impact

- (a) The Applicant shall present the predicted noise levels in L10 (1 hour) dB(A) at the selected assessment points at various representative floor levels (in m P.D.) on tables and plans of suitable scale.
- (b) The assessment shall cover the cumulative road traffic noise impact resulting from the road traffic noise due to the Project and existing road network on existing, committed and planned NSRs within the assessment area.
- (c) The potential road traffic noise impact under different scenarios shall be quantified by estimating the total number of dwellings, classrooms and other noise sensitive receivers that will be exposed to noise impact exceeding the criteria set in Annex 5 in the TM.

3.4 <u>Mitigation of Road Traffic Noise Impact</u>

3.4.1 *Direct Mitigation Measures*

(a) Where the predicted road traffic noise impact exceeds the criteria set in Annex 5, TM, the Applicant shall consider and evaluate direct mitigation measures including noise barrier/enclosure, etc. The feasibility, practicability, programming and effectiveness of the recommended mitigation measures shall be assessed. Any direct mitigation measures recommended should be well documented in the report. Specific reasons for not adopting certain direct

mitigation measures to reduce the noise to a level meeting the criteria in the TM or to maximise the protection for the NSRs as far as possible should be clearly quantified and documented in the EIA report.

- (b) The total number of noise sensitive receivers that will be benefited from and be protected by the provision of direct mitigation measures should be provided. The total number of other noise sensitive receivers that will still be exposed to noise above the criteria with the implementation of all recommended direct mitigation measures shall be quantified.
- (c) For planned noise sensitive uses which will still be affected even with practicable direct mitigation measures in place, the Applicant shall propose, evaluate and confirm the practicability of additional direct mitigation measures within the planned noise sensitive uses and shall make recommendations on how these noise sensitive uses will be designed for the information of relevant parties.
 - (d) The Applicant shall take into account agreed environmental requirements /constraints identified in the EIA study to assess the development potential of concerned sites which shall be made known to the relevant parties.

3.4.2 *Indirect Mitigation Measures*

- (a) Upon exhaust of direct mitigation measures, where the predicted road traffic noise impact still exceeds the criteria set in Table 1A of Annex 5 of the TM, the Applicant shall consider indirect mitigation measures in the form of window insulation and air-conditioning and evaluate in accordance with section 6.2 in Annex 13 of the TM.
- (b) The Applicant shall identify and estimate the total number of existing dwellings, classrooms and other noise sensitive elements which may qualify for indirect mitigation measures, the associated costs and any implications for such implementation.
- (c) For the purpose of determining eligibility of the affected premises for indirect mitigation measures, reference shall be made to methodology accepted by the recognised national/international organisation or methodologies adopted for Hong Kong projects having similar issues on proposing an assessment methodology for determining eligibility of the indirect mitigation measures which shall be confirmed with the Director with reference to section 4.4.2 of the TM, prior to the commencement of the assessment.

3.5 <u>Evaluation of Residual Road Traffic Noise Impact</u>

Upon exhaust of direct and indirect mitigation measures, if the mitigated noise impact still exceeds the relevant criteria in Annex 5 of the TM, the Applicant shall identify, predict and evaluate the residual road traffic noise impact in accordance with section 4.4.3 of the TM and section 6.2 in Annex 13 of the TM.

4. Fixed Noise Sources Impact Assessment

4.1 <u>Fixed Noise Sources Impact Assessment Methodology</u>

The Applicant shall carry out fixed noise sources impact assessment from the Project in accordance with the methodology in paragraph 5.2 of Annex 13 of the TM.

4.2 <u>Identification of Fixed Noise Sources Impact</u>

4.2.1 Identification of Assessment Area and Noise Sensitive Receivers (NSRs)

- (a) The Applicant shall propose the assessment area for agreement of the Director before commencing the assessment. The assessment area for the fixed noise impact shall generally include areas within 300 metres from the boundary of the Project and the works of the Project.
- (b) The Applicant shall identify all existing, committed and planned NSRs in the assessment area and select assessment points to represent identified NSRs for carrying out fixed noise sources impact assessment described below.
- (c) The assessment points shall be confirmed with the Director prior to the commencement of the quantitative fixed noise sources impact assessment and may be varied subject to the best and latest information available during the course of the EIA study.
- (d) A map showing the location and description such as name of building, use, and floor of each and every selected assessment point shall be given. Photographs of existing NSRs shall be appended to the EIA report.
- (e) For planned noise sensitive land uses without committed site layouts, the Applicant should use the relevant land use and planning parameters and conditions to work out representative site layouts for fixed noise sources impact assessment purpose. However, such parameters and conditions together with the representative site layouts and any constraints identified shall be confirmed with the relevant responsible parties including Planning Department and Lands Department.

4.2.2 Inventory of Noise Sources

- (a) The Applicant shall identify and quantify an inventory of noise sources for fixed noise sources impact assessment. The inventory of noise sources shall include noise associated with any permanent and temporary industrial noise sources.
- (b) The Applicant shall provide document or certificate, with a methodology accepted by recognised national/international organisation, for the sound power level of each type of fixed noise sources.
- (c) Validity of the inventory shall be confirmed with the relevant government departments/authorities and documented in the EIA report.

4.3 <u>Prediction and Evaluation of Fixed Noise Sources Impact</u>

4.3.1 Scenarios

- (a) The Applicant shall quantitatively assess the fixed noise sources impact of the Project, with respect to the criteria set in Annex 5 of the TM, of unmitigated scenario and mitigated scenario at assessment year of various operation modes including,
 - (i) the worst operation mode which represents the maximum noise emission in connection of identified noise sources of the Project; and
 - (ii) any other operation modes as confirmed with the Director.
- (b) Validity of the above operation modes shall be confirmed with relevant departments/authorities and documented in the EIA report.

4.3.2 Prediction of Noise Impact

- (a) The Applicant shall present the predicted noise levels in Leq (30 min) dB(A) at the selected assessment points at various representative floor levels (in m P.D.) on tables and plans of suitable scale.
- (b) The assessment shall cover the cumulative fixed noise sources impact associated with the operation of the Project on existing, committed and planned NSRs within the assessment area.
- (c) The potential fixed noise sources impact under different scenarios shall be quantified by estimating the total number of dwellings, classrooms and other noise sensitive receivers that will be exposed to noise impact exceeding the criteria set in Annex 5 in the TM.

4.4 <u>Mitigation of Fixed Noise Sources Impact</u>

4.4.1 Direct Mitigation Measures

Where the predicted fixed noise sources impact exceeds the criteria set in Table 1A of Annex 5 of the TM, the Applicant shall consider and evaluate direct mitigation measures including noise barrier/enclosure, screening by noise tolerant buildings, etc. The feasibility, practicability, programming and effectiveness of the recommended mitigation measures shall be assessed. Any direct mitigation measures recommended shall be well documented in the report. Specific reasons for not adopting certain direct mitigation measures to reduce the noise to a level meeting the criteria in the TM or to maximise the protection for the NSRs as far as possible should be clearly substantiated and documented in the EIA report.

4.5 <u>Evaluation of Residual Fixed Noise Sources Impact</u>

Upon exhaust of direct mitigation measures, if the mitigated noise impact still exceeds the relevant criteria in Annex 5 of the TM, the Applicant shall identify, predict, evaluate the residual fixed noise sources impact in accordance with section 4.4.3 of the TM and estimate the total number of existing dwellings, classrooms and other noise sensitive elements that will be exposed to residual noise impact exceeding the criteria set in Annex 5 in the TM.

Appendix D

Requirements for Ecological Impact Assessment (Terrestrial)

- 1. In the ecological impact assessment, the Applicant shall examine the flora, fauna and other components of the ecological habitats within the assessment area. The aim shall be to protect, maintain or rehabilitate the natural environment. In particular, the Project shall avoid or minimise impacts on recognised sites of conservation importance and other ecologically sensitive areas. The assessment shall identify and quantify as far as possible the potential ecological impacts to the natural environment and the associated wildlife groups and habitats/species arising from the Project including its construction and operation phases as well as the subsequent management and maintenance of the proposals.
- 2. The assessment shall include the followings:
 - (i) Review of the findings of relevant studies/surveys and collection of the available information regarding the ecological characters of the assessment area;
 - (ii) Evaluation of information collected and identification of any information gap relating to the assessment of potential ecological impact, and determine the ecological field surveys and investigations that are needed for an impact assessment as required in the following sections;
 - (iii) Carrying out necessary field surveys of at least 4 months covering the wet season, and investigations to verify the information collected in sub-section (ii) above, to fill the information gaps identified and to fulfill the objectives of the EIA study. The field surveys shall cover flora, fauna and any other habitats/ species of conservation importance;
 - (iv) Establishment of the general ecological profile of the assessment area based on data of relevant previous studies/surveys and results of the ecological field surveys, if any, and description of the characteristics of each habitat found. Major information to be provided shall include:
 - (a) description of the physical environment, including all recognised sites of conservation importance and other ecologically sensitive areas, and assessment of whether these sites/areas will be affected by the Project or not;
 - (b) habitat maps of suitable scale (1:1000 to 1:5000) showing the types and locations of habitats/species in the assessment area;
 - (c) ecological characteristics of each habitat type such as size, vegetation, type, species present, dominant species found, species diversity and

abundance, community structure, seasonal pattern, ecological value and inter-dependence of the habitats and species, and presence of any features of ecological importance;

- (d) representative colour photos of each habitat type and any important ecological features identified; and
- (e) species found that are rare, endangered and/or listed under local legislation, international conventions for conservation of wildlife/ habitats or Red Data Books.
- (v) Investigation and description of the existing wildlife uses of the various habitats with special attention to those wildlife groups and habitats with conservation interests, including:
 - (a) woodlands;
 - (b) natural streams and associated riparian habitats;
 - (c) vertebrates (e.g. avifauna, mammals, fish, herpetofauna);
 - (d) macroinvertebrates (e.g. butterflies and dragonflies); and
 - (e) any other habitats or species identified as having special conservation interests by this EIA study.
- (vi) Using suitable methodology and considering also other projects in the vicinity of the Project area reasonably likely to occur at the same time, identification and quantification as far as possible of any direct, indirect, on-site, off-site, primary, secondary and cumulative ecological impacts, such as destruction of habitats, reduction of species abundance/diversity, loss of roosting, breeding and feeding grounds, reduction of ecological carrying capacity, loss in ecological linkage and function, habitat fragmentation and any other possible disturbance caused by the Project, and in particular the followings:
 - (a) loss of habitats as mentioned in (v) above;
 - (b) disturbance to animals and plants, especially those as mentioned in (v) above;
 - (c) indirect impacts to recognized site of conservation importance mentioned in (vi) above; and

- (d) impacts due to potential changes in the water quality, hydrodynamics properties and hydrology on streams and alterations to riparian habitats during the construction and operation stages of the Project.
- (vii) Evaluation of ecological impact based on the best and latest information available during the course of the EIA study, using quantitative approach as far as practicable and covering construction and operation phases of the Project as well as the subsequent management and maintenance requirement of the Project;
- (viii) Recommendations for possible alternatives and practicable mitigation measures, such as restriction of works at specified season or time, adoption of appropriate construction methods and/or programme, to avoid, minimise and/or compensate for the adverse ecological impacts identified during construction and operation of the Project;
- (ix) Evaluation of the feasibility and effectiveness of the recommended mitigation measures and definition of the scope, type, location, implementation arrangement, resources requirement, subsequent management and maintenance of such measures;
- (x) Determination and quantification as far as possible of the residual ecological impacts after implementation of the proposed mitigation measures;
- (xi) Evaluation of the significance and acceptability of the residual ecological impacts by making reference to the criteria in Annex 8 of the TM; and
- (xii) Review of the need for and recommendation on any ecological monitoring programme required.

Appendix E

Requirements for Landscape and Visual Impact Assessment

- 1. The Applicant shall review relevant plan(s) and/or studies which may identify areas of high landscape value and recommend country park, coastal protection area, green belt and conservation area designations. Any guidelines on landscape and urban design strategies and frameworks that may affect the appreciation of the Project shall also be reviewed. The aim is to gain an insight to the future outlook of the area affected so as to assess whether the Project can fit into the surrounding setting. Any conflict with the statutory town plan(s) and any published land use plans shall be highlighted and appropriate follow-up action shall be recommended. A system shall be derived for judging landscape and visual impact significance as required under the Annexes 10 and 18 of the TM.
- 2. The Applicant shall describe, appraise, analyse and evaluate the existing and planned landscape resources and character of the assessment area. A system shall be derived for judging landscape and visual impact significance. Annotated oblique aerial photographs and plans of suitable scale showing the baseline landscape character areas and landscape resources and mapping of impact assessment shall be extensively used to present the findings of impact assessment. Descriptive text shall provide a concise and reasoned judgment from a landscape and visual point of view. The sensitivity of the landscape framework and its ability to accommodate change shall be particularly focused on. The Applicant shall identify the degree of compatibility of the Project with the existing and planned landscape setting, recreation and tourism related uses, and scenic spot. The landscape impact assessment shall quantify the potential landscape impact as far as possible so as to illustrate the significance of such impacts arising from the proposed development. Clear mapping of the landscape impact is required. Tree survey shall be carried out and the impacts on existing trees shall be addressed. Cumulative landscape and visual impacts of the Project with other committed and planned developments shall be assessed.
- 3. The Applicant shall assess the visual impacts of the Project. Clear illustration including mapping of visual impact is required. The assessment shall include the following:
 - (i) identification and plotting of visual envelope of the Project;
 - (ii) appraisal of existing visual resources and character as well as the future outlook of the visual system of the assessment area;
 - (iii) identification and justification of the key groups of existing and planned sensitive receivers within the visual envelope with regard to views from ground level, sea level and elevated vantage points, and clearly indicate the sensitive receivers on a plan of appropriate scale;
 - (iv) description of the visual compatibility of the Project with the surrounding and the planned setting, and its obstruction and interference with the key views of

the study areas;

- (v) identification and description of the severity of visual impacts in terms of distance, nature and number of sensitive receivers. The visual impacts of the Project with and without mitigation measures shall be included so as to demonstrate the effectiveness of the proposed mitigation measures; and
- (vi) evaluation and explanation with supportive arguments of factors considered in arriving the significance thresholds of visual impact. The visual impacts should include presentation of an evaluation matrix derived for judging impact significance.
- 4. The Applicant shall evaluate the merits of preservation in totality, in parts or total destruction of existing landscape and the establishment of a new landscape character area. In addition, alternative development options, alignment, design and construction methods that would avoid or reduce the identified landscape and visual impacts shall be considered and evaluated for comparison before adopting other mitigation or compensatory measures to alleviate the impacts. The applicant shall recommend mitigation measures which shall not only focus on damage reduction but also potential enhancement of existing landscape and visual quality of the area. The recommendations shall also be illustrated in landscape design and landscape/visual impact mitigation measure plan.
- 5. The mitigation measures shall also be included to mitigate the impact on the existing and planned land use and visually sensitive receivers. Parties shall be identified for the ongoing management and maintenance of the proposed mitigation works to ensure their effectiveness throughout the construction phase and operation phase of the Project, associated works, supporting facilities and essential infrastructures. A practical programme and funding proposal for the implementation of the recommendation measures shall be provided.
- 6. Annotated illustration materials such as colour perspective drawings, plans and section/elevation diagrams, annotated oblique aerial photographs, photographs taken at vantage points, and computer-generated photomontage shall be adopted to fully illustrate the landscape and visual impacts of the Project. In particular, the landscape and visual impacts of the Project with and without mitigation measures from representative viewpoints, particularly from views of the most severely affected visually sensitive receivers (i.e. worst case scenario), shall be properly illustrated in existing and planned setting at four stages (existing condition, Day 1 with no mitigation measures, Day 1 with mitigation measures and Year 10 with mitigation measures) by computer-generated photomontage so as to demonstrate the effectiveness of the proposed mitigation measures. Computer graphics shall be compatible with Microstation DGN file format. The Applicant shall record the technical details in preparing the illustration, which may need to be submitted for verification of the accuracy of the illustration.

Appendix F

Requirements for Water Quality Impact Assessment

- 1. The Applicant shall identify and analyse physical, chemical and biological disruptions of the water system(s) arising from the construction and operation of the Project.
- 2. The Applicant shall predict, quantify and assess any water quality impacts arising from the construction and operation of the Project.
- 3. The assessment shall include the following:
 - (i) the water quality impacts of effluent generated during the construction stage such as site runoff, groundwater infiltration from tunnel and cavern excavation, dewatering associated with drilling/piling activities, grouting and concrete washing and those specified in the ProPECC PN 1/94;
 - (ii) The water quality impacts of leachate generated from waste handling/compaction and seepage from waste collection vehicles, wash water from general washing and vehicles washing, surface runoff from contaminated areas, and sewage from on-site staff and visitors during the operation stage;
 - (iii) The water quality impacts arising from the proposed wastewater treatment facilities including discharge of treated effluent, and discharge of sewage and leachate under emergency situations during the operation stage; and
 - (iv) The water quality impacts on river courses, drainages system, groundwater system (including change in groundwater level) and service reservoirs around the work sites.
- 4. The Applicant shall address water quality impacts due to the construction phase and operational phase of the Project. Essentially, the assessment shall address the following:
 - (i) collect and review background information on affected existing and planned water systems, their respective catchments and sensitive receivers which might be affected by the Project;
 - (ii) characterise water quality of the water systems and sensitive receivers, which might be affected by the Project based on existing best available information and through appropriate site survey and tests when existing data are insufficient;

- (iii) identify and analyse relevant existing and planned future activities, beneficial uses and water sensitive receivers related to the affected water system(s). The Applicant should refer to, *inter alia*, those developments and uses earmarked on the relevant Outline Zoning Plans, Development Permission Area Plans, Outline Development Plans and Layout Plans, and any other relevant published land use plans;
- (iv) identify pertinent water quality objectives and establish other appropriate water quality criteria or standards for the water system(s) and the sensitive receivers identified in (i), (ii) & (iii) above;
- (v) review the specific construction methods and configurations, and operation of the Project to identify and predict the likely water quality impacts arising from the Project;
- (vi) identify any alternation of any water courses, natural streams, ponds, wetlands, change of water holding/flow regimes of water bodies, change of catchment types of areas, erosion or sedimentation, change in groundwater level due to the Project and any other hydrological changes in the assessment area;
- (vii) identify and quantify existing and likely future water pollution sources, including those identified in 3(i), (ii) & (iii), other point and non-point sources discharges, and polluted discharge generated from the Project;
- (viii) provide an emission inventory on the quantities and characteristics of those existing and future pollution sources in the study area. Field investigation and laboratory test shall be conducted as appropriate to fill relevant information gaps;
- (ix) predict and quantify the impacts on the water system(s) and its/ their sensitive receivers due to those alternations and changes identified in (vi) above, and the pollution sources identified in (vii) above. The prediction shall take into account and include possible different construction and operation stages of the Project;
- (x) assess the cumulative impacts due to other related concurrent and planned projects, activities or pollution sources within the study area that may have a bearing on the environmental acceptability of the Project;
- (xi) analyse the provision and adequacy of existing and planned future facilities to reduce pollution arising from the point and non-point sources identified in (vii) above;

- (xii) develop effective infrastructure upgrading or provision, contingency plan, water pollution prevention and mitigation measures to be implemented during construction and operation stages, including provision of wastewater treatment facilities for the handling, treatment and disposal of wastewater, contingency plan for any emergency discharge of raw sewage and leachate, measures for prevention of groundwater contamination from pollution sources and for prevention of leachate seepage during waste transportation so as to reduce the water quality impacts to within standards. The Applicant shall assess the capacity of the downstream public sewerage to ensure the quantity of treated effluent discharged from the Project is within limits, if appropriate. Effluent generated from the Project shall require appropriate collection, treatment, reuse (if appropriate) and disposal;
- (xiii) investigate and develop best management practices to reduce storm water and non-point source pollution including leachate seepage during waste transportation as appropriate; and
- (xiv) evaluate and quantify residual impacts on water system(s) and the sensitive receivers with regard to the appropriate water quality objectives, criteria, standards or guidelines.

Appendix G

Requirements for Hazard to Life Assessment

LPG

- 1. The Applicant shall carry out hazard assessment to evaluate the risk from the two petrol-cum-LPG filling stations (currently operated by ExxonMobil and Sinopec respectively in the vicinity of the Project) to the Project during construction and operation stages of the Project. The hazard assessment shall include:
 - (i) identify hazardous scenarios associated with the above petrol-cum-LPG filling stations and then determine a set of relevant scenarios to be included in a Quantitative Risk Assessment (QRA);
 - (ii) execute a QRA of the set of hazardous scenarios determined in item (i), expressing population risks in both individual and societal terms;
 - (iii) compare individual and societal risks with the criteria for evaluating hazard to life stipulated in Annex 4 of the TM; and
 - (iv) identify and assess practicable and cost-effective risk mitigation measures.
- 2. The methodology to be used in the hazard assessment should be consistent with previous studies having similar issues (e.g. Kai Tak Development (No. AEIAR-130/2009)).

Explosives

- 3. If use of explosives for rock blasting is required and there exists magazine(s) for overnight storage of explosives for the Project, the Applicant shall carry out hazard assessment as follows:
 - (i) Identify hazardous scenarios associated with any storage, use and transport of explosives and then determine a set of relevant scenarios to be included in a Quantitative Risk Assessment (QRA);
 - (ii) Execute a QRA of the set of hazardous scenarios determined in (i), expressing population risks in both individual and societal terms;
 - (iii) Compare individual and societal risks with the criteria for evaluating hazard to life stipulated in Annex 4 of the TM; and
 - (iv) Identify and assess practicable and cost-effective risk mitigation measures.
- 4. The methodology to be used in the hazard assessment should be consistent with previous studies having similar issues (e.g. Approved EIA report for Sha Tin Cavern Sewage Treatment Works (No. AEIAR-202/2016)).

Appendix H

Requirements for Assessment of Waste Management Implications

The assessment of waste management implications shall cover the following:

1. Analysis of Activities and Waste Generation

- (i) The Applicant shall identify the quantity, quality and timing of the wastes arising as a result of the construction and operation activities of the Project based on the sequence and duration of these activities, e.g. any construction and demolition (C&D) materials, chemical waste and other wastes which will be generated during construction and operation stages.
- (ii) The Applicant shall adopt appropriate design, general layout, construction methods and programme to minimise the generation of public fill/inert C&D materials and maximise the use of public fill/inert C&D materials for other construction works.

2. Proposal for Waste Management

- (i) Prior to considering the disposal options for various types of wastes, opportunities for reducing waste generation, on-site or off-site re-use and recycling shall be evaluated. Measures that can be taken in the planning and design stages e.g. by modifying the design approach and in the construction stage for maximising waste reduction shall be separately considered;
- (ii) After considering the opportunities for reducing waste generation and maximising re-use, the types and quantities of the wastes required to be disposed of as a consequence shall be estimated and the disposal methods/options for each type of wastes shall be described in detail. The disposal methods/options recommended for each type of wastes shall take into account the result of the assessment in section (iv) below;
- (iii) The EIA report shall state the transportation routings and the frequency of the trucks/vessels involved, any barging point or conveyor system to be used, the stockpiling areas and the disposal outlets for the wastes identified; and
- (iv) The impact caused by handling (including stockpiling, labelling, packaging & storage), collection, transportation and re-use/disposal of wastes shall be addressed in detail and appropriate mitigation measures shall be proposed. This assessment shall cover the following areas:
 - potential hazard;
 - air and odour emissions;
 - noise;
 - wastewater discharge; and
 - public transport.

Appendix I

Requirements for Land Contamination Assessment

- 1. The Applicant shall identify the potential land contamination site(s) within the scope of the Project area and, if any, within the boundaries of associated areas (e.g. work areas) of the Project.
- 2. The Applicant shall provide a clear and detailed account of the present land use (including description of the activities, chemicals and hazardous substances handled, with clear indication of their storage and location, by reference to a site layout plan) and a complete past land uses history, in chronological order, in relation to possible land contamination (including accident records and change of land use(s) and the like).
- 3. If any contaminated land uses as stated in Sections 3.1 and 3.2 of Annex 19 in the TM are identified with the scope of the Project, the Applicant shall carry out the land contamination assessment as detailed from sub-sections (i) to (iii) below and propose measure(s) to avoid disposal:
 - (i) During the course of the EIA study, the Applicant shall submit a Contamination Assessment Plan (CAP) to the Director for endorsement prior to conducting an actual contamination impact assessment of the land or site(s). The CAP shall include proposal with details on representative sampling and analysis required to determine the nature and the extent of the contamination of the land or site(s). Alternatively, the Applicant may refer to other previously agreed and still relevant and valid CAP(s) for the concerned site(s).
 - (ii) Based on the endorsed CAP, the Applicant shall conduct a land contamination impact assessment and submit a Contamination Assessment Report (CAR) to the Director for endorsement. If land contamination is confirmed, a Remediation Action Plan (RAP) to formulate viable remedial measures with supporting documents, such as agreement by the relevant facilities management authorities, shall be submitted to the Director for approval. The Applicant shall then clean up the contaminated land or site(s) according to the approved RAP, and a Remediation Report (RR) to demonstrate adequate clean-up should be prepared and submitted to the Director for endorsement prior to the commencement of any development or redevelopment works within the Study Area. The CAP, CAR and RAP shall be documented in the EIA report.
 - (iii) If there are potential contaminated sites which are inaccessible for conducting sampling and analysis during the course of the EIA study, e.g. due to site access problem, the Applicant's CAP shall include:
 - (a) a review of the available and relevant information;

- (b) an initial contamination evaluation of these sites and possible remediation methods;
- (c) a confirmation of whether the contamination problem at these sites would be surmountable;
- (d) a sampling and analysis proposal which shall aim at determining the nature and the extent of the contamination of these sites; and
- (e) where appropriate, a schedule of submission of revised or supplementary CAP, CAR, RAP and RR as soon as these sites become accessible.

Appendix K

Requirements for EIA Report Documents

- 1. The Applicant shall supply the Director with the following number of copies of the EIA report and the executive summary:
 - (i) 30 copies of the EIA report and 30 copies of the bilingual (in both English and Chinese) executive summary as required under section 6(2) of the EIAO to be supplied at the time of application for approval of the EIA report.
 - (ii) When necessary, addendum to the EIA report and the executive summary submitted in item (i) above as required under section 7(1) of the EIAO, to be supplied upon advice by the Director for public inspection.
 - (iii) 30 copies of the EIA report and 50 copies of the bilingual (in both English and Chinese) executive summary with or without Addendum as required under section 7(5) of the EIAO, to be supplied upon advice by the Director for consultation with the Advisory Council on the Environment.
- 2. To facilitate public inspection of EIA report via EIAO Internet Website, the Applicant shall provide electronic copies of both the EIA report and the executive summary prepared in HyperText Markup Language (HTML) and in Portable Document Format (PDF), unless otherwise agreed by the Director. For both of the HTML and PDF versions, a content page capable of providing hyperlink to each section and sub-section of the EIA report and the executive summary shall be included in the beginning of the document. Hyperlinks to figures, drawings and tables in the EIA report and the executive summary shall be provided in the main text from where respective references are made. The EIA report, including drawings, tables, figures and appendices shall be viewable by common web-browsers including Internet Explorer 8, Firefox 23, Chrome and Safari 8 or later versions as agreed by the Director, and support languages including Traditional Chinese, Simplified Chinese and English.
- 3. The electronic copies of the EIA report and the executive summary shall be submitted to the Director at the time of application for approval of the EIA report.
- 4. When the EIA report and the executive summary are made available for public inspection under section 7(1) of the EIAO, the content of the electronic copies of the EIA report and the executive summary must be the same as the hard copies and the Director shall be provided with the most updated electronic copies.
- 5. To promote environmentally friendly and efficient dissemination of information, both hardcopies and electronic copies of future EM&A reports recommended by the EIA study shall be required and their format shall be agreed by the Director.
